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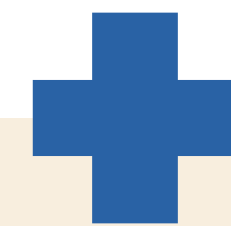

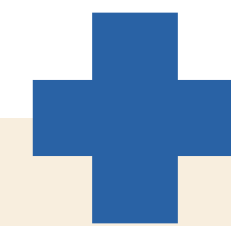

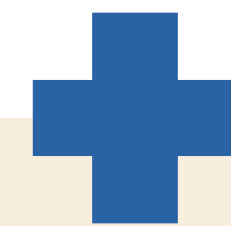
Team members from different disciplines contribute with their specific knowledge, competencies and shared responsibilities to a joint **problem solving process** throughout the ECI journey. In this journey, the family is an equal member of the team, as they have very specific knowledge about their child, their family, and their hopes for the future. The primary service provider (PSP) is the team member who supports the family address the child's development from a holistic perspective. The PSP is not alone, he keeps in touch with other providers on the team.

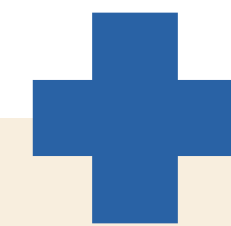

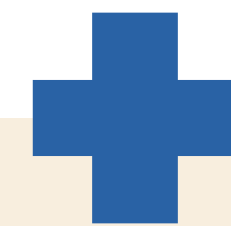

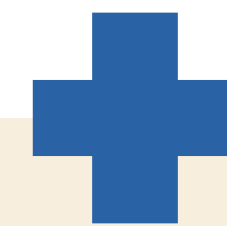

In the planning process, families and professionals are working together to identify the priorities the family has for their child and themselves, **to choose goals that reflect those priorities, and to develop the strategies and activities that are the best match for the child and family.** A well written plan is much more than filling out a piece of paper; if done well, **the process of planning with families can build partnerships, self-efficacy, resilience and hope.** This will contribute to improve family quality of life.

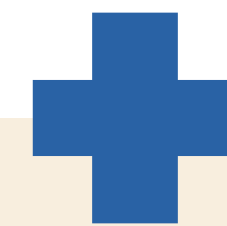

Environment

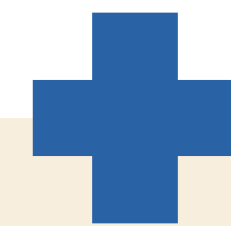


Activities and Routines

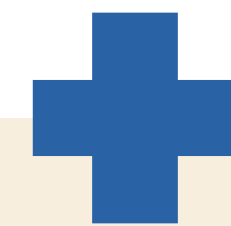


Intervention

In the spirit of Eurlyaid we mean that **more than the intervention process, it is the parent /professionals collaboration and interactions that account for the quality of intervention.** This requires on part of the professionals' specific skills, knowledge and resources. So professional development, reflective practices and supervision are key elements to provide the highest quality services to children and families.

Parents are at the heart of ECI and how professionals support parents (enabling and empowering) ultimately, determines how parents experience the quality of the intervention. To talk about quality of intervention in this section, we will hear parents' voices about their experiences on ECI.
